COMMANDER'S REPORT:

Holiday Season's greetings to "one and all." It is hard to believe that Halloween has come and gone with Thanksgiving soon being upon us. Our chapter operations continue at a most successful pace and filled with great milestone achievements, with regard to our published Chapter Action Plan for the current 2024-2025 MOWW operation year. WE also congratulate everyone who contributed to our most successful chapter recruitment campaign ever in our chapter operational history. According to HQ MOWW current recruitment numbers, our chapter is currently listed among the top four recruiting chapter efforts Order-wide! Wishing all our companions and supporting affiliates and community partners a wonderful Holiday Season 2024.

TREASURER'S REPORT:

Our current 2024-2025 end of second quarter chapter account fund balances are as follows, thus far in the current operating year. The chapter CHASE bank account balance, as of the end of November shows us at SAVINGS - \$440.02 / CHECKING - \$568.46 USDs. The Chapter AZYLC Program Fundraising Campaign US Bank account balance is \$3,453.69 USDs. The next significant account deposit will be for DEC 2024. Our chapter has been notified that it will be presented with a Country Fair White Elephant (CFWE) non-profit organization Grant Committee Patriotic Education Program support donation in Green Valley, AZ (12 DEC). We anticipate the grant committee donation to at least be equal to what was received last year (\$3,500.00 USDs). These added funds will keep our chapter operations flowing through the beginning of the annual ROTC-JROTC awards season - towards the end of MAR (end of QTR-3) and the early months of APR-MAY-JUN (QTR-4) when our attention will focus on whther an annual P&M Dividend payout will be authorized this operating year to help defray operational costs until the end of the current OY in JUNE.

ADJUTANT'S REPORT:

Season's greetings to everyone. Our chapter operations continue successfully and, in some Chapter Action Plan stated goal areas, ahead of schedule. Our chapter is currently showing our recruitment OY achievement at 133% of our HQ MOWW assigned category recruitment goal. Our chapter is also currently showing an IRS Reporting Veteran Percentage status of 78% and climbing. This is due to continued recruitment emphasis on bring in new companions with military services records, as a prime consideration. Meanwhile, our chapter continues to attract and bank new prospects in to our chapter Patriot Program - in anticipation of further broadening of current MOWW recruitment policy in the coming year(s). While still not a major concern, our chapter needs to take a more pro-active fundraising stance, when it comes to building our participation support for our Region XIII AZYLC summer program. The conference program lasted about one and a half hours, with presentations by the Council of Area Commanders, Chair.

MONTHLY FEATURED ARTICLE

My Thunderstorm Project

At the end of a weekend in 1950, Lieutenant John L. Peterson and I, both forecasters, took off from Selfridge Field, Michigan, our home base, in a single-engine plane, an AT-6 (we called it "T-6"). We challenged thunderstorms in pitch darkness for what seemed half a night and landed at Chanute Field, Illinois, where we were students in the Specialized High Altitude Forecasting School. I was enjoying the solid feel of



concrete Chanute's ramp as Peterson, the pilot, "I said. was worried about how I was going to get you out of there," referring to the T-6. Then, as we unbuckled our parachutes, added: "I decided I would have to roll it over (the T-6) and drop you out." As a buck

sergeant I was lucky in being sent to the school, but it came at a bad time. I wanted to assist dad, Louis Cogut, and father-in-law, Walter Nordstrom. On their own volition, the two were enlarging our house. Only a mile from Selfridge, it was too small but one Marie and I could afford. In class one day Peterson had asked me to go to Selfridge in the T-6. On approach to Selfridge, he flew us directly over the house. Too quick to be

sure, I thought I saw Marie's father standing on the bay window roof, building a dormer and a second floor (photo left by Marie Cogut). On the return flight, we ran into thunderstorms. I wanted to know more about thunderstorms. A couple years earlier Air Force made tests: *The*



Thunderstorm Project (published in 1948). P-61 WWll night fighters called "Black Widows," were flown into thunderstorms in Ohio and Florida. If any crashed, I didn't know of it, and it gave me confidence that flying into thunderstorms wasn't a sure bet you'd crash Strong winds and our going in and around thunderheads caused Peterson, a skilled pilot, to lose his bearings. He took the T-6 down low and found Battle Creek, Michigan, northwest of our track. From my seat in back, attention was fixed on constant lightning flashes, sparking all around. I don't recall unusual buffeting. Tough plane, the T-6. Peterson corrected heading and we had an intended landing. As we walked away from the T-6 he said: "We only had 15 minutes of fuel left." I think that great friend mainly made the trip for me to see family and the work on our house, and it gave me my thunderstorm project.

Note: Decades later, at a warrant officer's meeting in Tucson, a CWO from California said Peterson, his uncle, had retired as a major and sadly was deceased. **TLC**

NOVEMBER IN HISTORY

November 1

November 1st - All Hallows Day, also known as All Saints Day among Roman Catholics, commemorating those who have no special feast day.

November 1, 1700 - Charles II of Spain died and was succeeded by Philip V, resulting in the War of Spanish Succession.

November 1, 1776 - Mission San Juan Capistrano was founded in California. Each year, the swallows of Capistrano leave their nests there around St. John's Day (October 23rd) and return the following year near St. Joseph's Day (March 19th).

November 1, 1848 - The first medical school for women opened in Boston. The Boston Female Medical School was founded by Samuel Gregory with just twelve students. In 1874, the school merged with the Boston University School of Medicine, becoming one of the first co-ed medical schools.

November 1, 1936 - The Rome-Berlin Axis was proclaimed by Italian Dictator Benito Mussolini following a visit to Berlin by Italian Foreign Secretary Ciano.

November 1, 1950 - President Harry S. Truman was the target of an unsuccessful assassination attempt by two members of a Puerto Rican nationalist movement.

November 1, 1963 - South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem and his brother Ngo Dinh Nhu were <u>killed</u> in a military coup.

November 1, 1993 - The European Union came into existence as a result of the Maastricht Treaty.

November 1, 1995 - The first all-race local government elections took place in South Africa, marking the end of the apartheid system.

November 2

November 2, 1721 - Peter I was proclaimed Emperor of all the Russias.

November 2, 1930 - Haile Selassie was crowned Emperor of Ethiopia.

November 2, 1947 - The first and only flight of Howard Hughes' "Spruce Goose" flying boat occurred in Long Beach Harbor, California. It flew about a mile at an altitude of 70 feet. Costing \$25 million, the 200-ton plywood eight-engine Hercules was the world's largest airplane, designed, built and flown by Hughes. It later became a tourist attraction alongside the Queen Mary ship at Long Beach and has since been moved to Oregon.

November 2, 1962 - During the <u>Cuban Missile Crisis</u>, President John F. Kennedy announced on TV, "the Soviet bases in Cuba are being dismantled, their missiles and related equipment being crated, and the fixed installations at these sites are being destroyed."

Birthday - American frontiersman Daniel Boone (1734-1820) was born in Berks County, near Reading, Pennsylvania.

Birthday - <u>James K. Polk</u> (1795-1849) the 11th U.S. President was born in Mecklenburg County, North Carolina. He served from March 4, 1845 to March 3, 1849. He declined to be a candidate for a second term, saying he was "exceedingly relieved" at the completion of his presidency.

November 3, 1534 - King Henry VIII became Supreme Head of the Church of England following the passage of the Act of Supremacy by Parliament.
