National Youth Civics Summit (NYCS) – MOWW in partnership with the MOWW Foundation, is conducting its first NYCS from July 7th - 13th on the campus of American University in Washington, DC.

NYCS is an apolitical and non-partisan event that aims to enhance the civic education of high school students from across the country by providing them with firsthand experiences in and around the Washington, DC area, including Capitol Hill, the US State Department, Mount Vernon, Gettysburg, and more.

This immersive week-long program offers students a unique opportunity to interact with politicians and observe high-ranking appointed officials in action around Capitol Hill, including visits to institutions such as the Supreme Court, the Defense Department, and various other U.S. government agencies.

Throughout the summit, students will also embark on guided tours of significant monuments, participate in simulated classes, and engage in various leadership-building activities, empowering them to become informed and engaged leaders with a deeper

HISTORIAN ARTICLE

VETERANS ADMINISTRATION AND NATIONAL CEMETERIES

The nation's Memorial Day 2024 ceremonies was observed on the last Monday of May. Ceremonies honored the men and women who died while serving in the U.S. military.

Originally known as Decoration Day, it originated in the years following the Civil War and became an official federal holiday in 1971. Many Americans observe Memorial Day by visiting cemeteries or memorials,

holding family gatherings and participating in parades.

The Veterans
Administration (VA) became steward of the 111-year-old National Cemetery System on September 1, 1973. In 1989, VA was elevated to the Department of Veterans

Affairs, a cabinet-level agency. On November 11, 1998, the National Cemetery System was re-designated as the National Cemetery Administration, and the NCA principal was elevated from Director to Under Secretary of Veterans Affairs for Memorial Affairs.

The history of the present National Cemetery
Administration evolution makes for an interesting read

reflecting the many conflicts the nation has engaged and the development of our nation's honoring the Americans who have made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of our

NATIONAL PROGRAM ARTICLE

HOMELAND SECURITY (HS)

Mission Areas

The Secretary of The Department of Homeland Security oversees the third largest Cabinet Department and leads our nation's efforts to secure our country from terrorism to natural disasters. DHS has a vital mission to secure the nation from the many threats we face. This requires the dedication of more than 260,000 employees, in jobs that range from aviation and border security, to emergency response, from cybersecurity analyst to chemical facility inspector. DHS has five distinct mission areas related to securing the homeland, which includes the largest law enforcement population in the Federal Government.

The following depicts Mission Critical Occupations that most directly affect the Department's mission success. Priority mission critical occupations listed below are identified as having the greatest impact on the Department's goals and objectives:

US Secret Service

- Criminal Investigator Special agents investigate violations of laws relating to financial crimes such as credit card and access device fraud, as well as computer-based attacks on the nation's banking and telecommunications. In the field of protection Secret Service special agents develop and implement innovative strategies to mitigate threats to our nation's leaders.
- Police (Uniformed Division) Protect facilities and venues secured for U.S. Secret Service protectees. Provides security for the Treasury Department building and foreign diplomatic missions in Washington, D.C. Transportation Security Agency
- •Federal Air Marshal Detects, deters and defeats hostile acts against aviation. Federal Air Marshals are armed federal law enforcement officers deployed on passenger flights worldwide to protect airline passengers and crew against the risk of criminal and terrorist violence.
- •Transportation Security Officer Conduct security screening of passengers, baggage and cargo at airports to prevent any deadly or dangerous objects from being transported onto an aircraft.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement

- •Deportation Officer Uphold U.S. immigration law at, within, and beyond our borders against those who present a danger to our national security, are a threat to public safety, or who otherwise undermine the integrity of our immigration system.
- Criminal Investigator protect the United States against terrorist and other criminal organizations that threaten our safety and national security. Also targets transnational criminal enterprises that seek to exploit America's legitimate trade, travel, and financial systems.

NATIONAL SECURITY (NS)

(Article to inform readers on the Geographic and Functional Combatant Commands)
The Unified Command Plan (UCP) is a strategic document that establishes the missions, responsibilities, and geographic areas of responsibility for commanders of combatant commands. The UCP is a classified executive branch document prepared by the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. The CJCS normally reviews the UCP every two years and makes recommendations to the President, through the Secretary of Defense, on changes that may be necessary.

There are currently 11 unified combatant commands in the Department of Defense – four functional and seven geographic. Functional combatant commands operate world-wide across geographic boundaries and provide unique capabilities to geographic combatant commands and the armed services, while geographic combatant commands operate in clearly delineated areas of responsibility and have a regional military focus.

- AFRICOM: U.S. Africa Command, Kelley Barracks, Stuttgart, Germany
- EUCOM: U.S. European Command, Patch Barracks, Stuttgart, Germany
- NORTHCOM: U.S. Northern Command, Peterson Air Force Base, Colorado
- INDOPACOM: U.S. Indo-Pacific Command, Camp H.M. Smith, Hawaii
- SOUTHCOM: U.S. Southern Command, Miami, Florida
- SPACECOM: U.S. Space Command, Peterson Space Force Base, Colorado

Functional Combatant Commands

- SOCOM: U.S. Special Operations Command, MacDill Air Force Base, Tampa, Florida
- TRANSCOM: U.S. Transportation Command, Scott Air Force Base, Illinois

PUBLIC SAFETY/LAW & ORDER (PS/L&O)

El Paso-Teller County 9-1-1 Authority (Authority)

Mission: The El Paso-Teller County 9-1-1 Authority shall provide the public reliable access to public safety agencies by managing high-quality, redundant, secure, and cost-effective 9-1-1 services while providing exceptional customer service to Authority stakeholders.

The Authority is governed by a board of nine members that work to create a balanced budget each year to provide equipment and services to the seven 9-1-1 call taking and dispatch centers in the two-county region. The Authority provides Quality Assurance, Training, Information Technology Services, Geographic Information Services, and Public Education.

- The Information Technology team monitors the health of the 9-1-1 system, deploys new hardware and software solutions that are used to process 9-1-1 calls, and are on-call 24 hours a day, seven days a week, 365 days a year to ensure 100% uptime.
- The Geographic Information Systems (GIS) team manages the Master Street Address Guide and provides mapping solutions to first responders and the 9-1-1 call taking and dispatch centers.
- The Public Education team provides a variety of community outreach programs that include public education for schools, community events, civic groups, and work in collaboration with first responders during safety events.
- The Quality Assurance/Training team evaluates hundreds of 9-1-1 calls each month and provides timely feedback to the call takers to ensure the calls

are processed according to the nationally accepted standards. The team conducts training in emergency dispatch protocol for police, fire, and EMS.

Memorial Day Trivia

National Cemetery Burials

Most Americans believe only military members and family members are buried in the national cemetery system. What is not commonly known is that in addition to Federal service members, more than a thousand World War I and World War II enemy POWs, and approximately 12,000 Confederate POWs, are buried or memorialized in VA cemeteries consistent with U.S. law and recognized rules of war (set out in the Geneva Conventions of 1949, and the Additional Protocols of 1977, Hague Conventions 1899–1907, and customary international law). Another thousand ally foreign nationals are buried in these cemeteries. Approximately one-quarter of NCA's cemeteries no longer offer burial space and are preserved as historic resources.
